This summer, brother Andrew Parsons had the opportunity to intern at the Phi Kappa Tau national headquarters. He reflects upon finishing his internship.

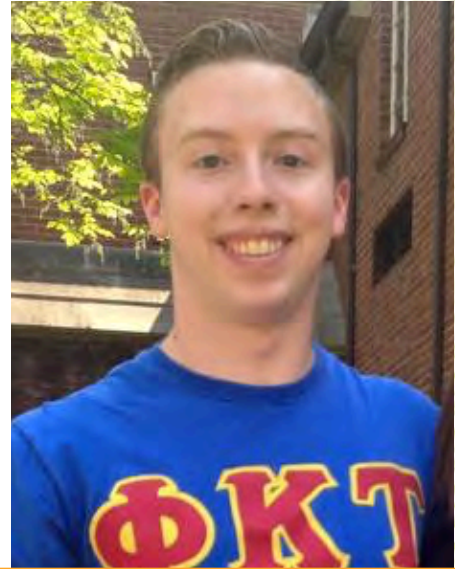

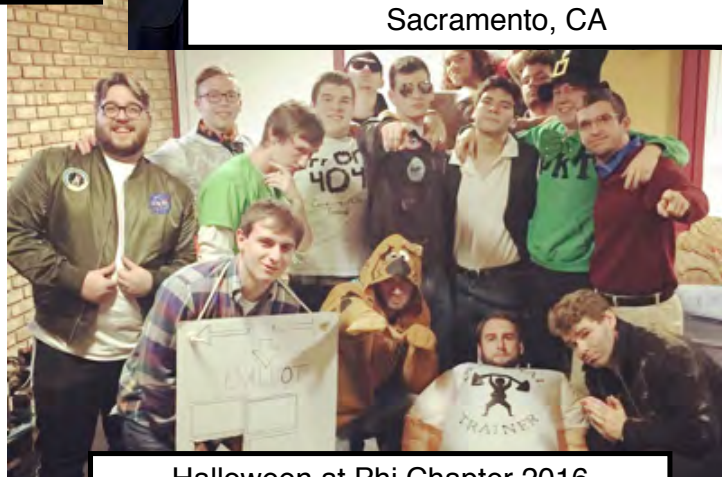
